Steven Ascher, is an Academy Award-nominated director and writer who directed "Our Towns" the documentary. He's the author of The Filmmaker's Handbook, and has taught filmmaking. The Boston Globe calls his work "filmmaking at its finest."

Rev. Jeffrey Brown, M.A., a Baptist minister, has for years helped cities and police departments across the country address youth violence and develop plans to make communities safer and fairer. Today those stakes are as great as they have ever been.

Rev. Brown, who has presented to the Jefferson several times, including in 2020, was a central figure in the "Boston Miracle," which succeeded in significantly lowering youth crime and gang violence in Boston's most troubled neighborhoods. His message of working within stressed communities rather than from an authority perspective has resonated with people of all faiths, races, and occupations. Famously, he once said he learned some of his most important life lessons, not in the "hallowed halls of a seminary," but from drug dealers, prostitutes, and gang members.

He is co-founder of the Boston Ten Point Coalition, the group that inspired a 79 percent drop in violent crime in the 1990s.

Camille Busette, Ph.D., receivied her academic training at the University of California at Berkley and the University of Chicago, then embarked on a career at the World Bank, where she confronted issues of extreme poverty, lack of access to health, education, sanitation, and the labor market. She now heads the Race, Prosperity, and Inclusion initiative at Brookings.

Dr. Busette is also a friend to the Jefferson, having appeared several times in Jefferson programs, including a digital presentation in 2020 and 2019's Global Summit when she discussed new approaches to addressing race and belonging. She is currently working as a project

consultant with Erie-based advocacy groups on a new policy strategy titled "Race, Prosperity, and and master's and doctoral degrees in electrical Inclusion."

James Fallows & Deborah Fallows, fre-

quent presenters and longtime supporters of the Jefferson, were named honorary Erie citizens by Mayor Joe Schember in 2018 as they were presented the Thomas B. Hagen Dignitas Award at Global Summit X. Their national coverage of news, culture, and trends included Erie as part of the "Our Towns" book that put a spotlight on America's smaller cities, their struggles, and proactive efforts to reinvent themselves.

In addition to a storied career as a journalist, essayist, book author, commentator, and analyst for NPR's "Weekend All Things Considered," James Fallows was the chief speechwriter for President Jimmy Carter for two years.

Deborah Fallows, James' wife and partner, is a Harvard graduate and later earned a Ph.D. in Linguistics. She researches and writes on many subjects, though primarily on education, and her work has appeared in The Atlantic, the former Atlantic Monthly, National Geographic, and Newsweek.

Together their work on "Our Towns: A 100,000 -Mile Journey into the Heart of America" has been transferred to documentary film

Ralph Ford, Ph.D., is Chancellor of Penn State Behrend. He joined the college in 1994 as a faculty member where he then served as department chair. before he was named director of the School of Engineering. He served as interim chancellor beginning in July 2015 and became Chancellor in January 2016. He is the author of more than 40 publications. He holds a bachelor's degree in

electrical engineering from Clarkson University engineering from the University of Arizona.

Nile Gardiner, Ph.D., a leading authority on Brexit, is the director of the Margaret Thatcher Center for Freedom at The Heritage Foundation. He previously served as a foreign policy aide to the late Prime Minister Thatcher in her private office in London, assisting her with her last book, "Statecraft: Strategies for a Changing World," and advising her on a number of international issues. Dr. Gardiner is credited with helping to shape her foreign policy, which included urging Great Britain to consider leaving the European Union and laying the foundation for Brexit several years after her death in 2013.

Dr. Gardiner received his M.A., M.Phil., and Ph.D. degrees in History from Yale University, and B.A. and M.A. in Modern History from Oxford University. He has also served as a foreign policy adviser to three American presidential candidates.

Baher Ghosheh, Ph.D. holds a Ph.D. in Economic Development from SUNY-Buffalo and has been a Professor of Middle Eastern Studies, cultural and economic Geography at Edinboro University since 1989. He has graduate degrees in International Relations/Middle Eastern Studies, International Trade, and Comparative Economic Development. A native of Jerusalem, Dr. Ghosheh has lived in eight countries, traveled to fifty-nine countries, and has taught in Japan, China, Russia, Italy, and Morocco. He has authored one book, book chapters or Russia and the Middle East and 60+ articles on the Middle East, Asia, and Japan. He was awarded a Fulbright to conduct research in Malaysia and Singapore and was selected as the Pennsylvania Geographer of the Year and Edinboro University's Educator of the Year. He is a

Ambassador Christopher Hill, M.A., Christopher Hill credits his work with the Peace Corps in the mid-1970s for teaching him his first lessons in diplomacy and he went on to become one of the more accomplished diplomats in modern American history.

Fluent in five languages, Hill speaks English, Polish, Serbo-Croatian, Macedonian, and Albanian. He needed all of those skills as he served as U.S. Ambassador to Macedonia from 1996 to 1999; Special Envoy to Kosovo in 1998 and 1999; Ambassador to Poland from 2000 to 2004; and Ambassador to the Republic of Korea from 2004 to 2005 before being appointed as Assistant Secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific Affairs.

Although Hill is not widely known in the United States, he became a celebrity in China as chief envoy in talks on North Korea's nuclear weapons program. He is currently the George W. Ball adjunct professor at Columbia University in the City of New York.

Hill received a master's degree from the Naval War College in 1994.

Ignatius' rare career includes a number of bestselling spy novels that feature his understanding of the CIA and a number of foreign nations and their operations. He once explained to an interviewer that his novelwriting career started when "it was obvious that the only way I could share this world of fact was through fiction. ... I realized that what makes a novel seem real, paradoxically, is its departure from actual life: The way it's re-imagined in the mind of the writer gives it a
