JES LECTURER BIOGRAPHIES

Richard Arthur, M.A., is a native of Pittsburgh who has a lifelong interest in American Colonial History. A retired Army officer and adult educator, he currently is serving as Chairman of the Washington Statue Centennial and Rededication Committee that is preserving the statue of 21-year-old Washington on his first public mission to Fort LeBoeuf in present-day Erie County. He and his wife Mary Lou operate Winter's End, a bird, bee, and butterfly habitat in rural Erie County. Richard is the Curator at Eagle Hotel Museum in Waterford.

Parris J. Baker, PhD., Associate Professor and Director, Social Work, Mortuary Science, and Gerontology Programs, Department of Criminal Justice & Social Work, Gannon University. He received his undergraduate, graduate, and doctoral degrees in social work from Gannon University, Case Western Reserve University, Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences, and the University of Pittsburgh, School of Social Work, respectively. In 2011, Dr. Baker became the first African American tenured professor at Gannon University. He most recently became a Jefferson Education Society Scholar-In-Residence and Harry T. Burleigh and Beyond Fellow.

Rev. Charles Brock, M.Litt. is director of the Brock Institute for Mega Issues Education at the Jefferson Educational Society. An Erie native, Rev. Brock is an emeritus fellow, chaplain, and director of Ministerial Education at Mansfield College, Oxford, UK, where he taught for 35 years. In addition to being a founding member of the Jefferson and serving as Secretary of the Jefferson Board of Trustees, Rev. Brock is acting minister of The First Unitarian Universalist Church of Girard.

Karen Bilowith, M.P.A., joined the Erie Community Foundation in October 2021. She leads the foundation's efforts to improve the quality of life in the region in partnership with generous donors, effective nonprofit agencies, community leaders and a committed board of trustees and staff. Karen was formerly the president and CEO of the Idaho Community Foundation, and she held the position of president and CEO of the Community Foundation for the Greater Capital Region as well as an executive position with United Way in upstate New York. Karen holds a master's degree in public administration from the University of Colorado and a bachelor's degree in economics from Boston College and is a current board member of Pennsylvania Association of Community Foundations.

Sonya Byes is someone familiar with the lights, cameras, and action! As an African American female-led media company operator in Erie, Sonya Byes is shattering glass ceilings in the media realm. Ms. Byes is the creator/owner/founder and host of Erie's local talk show, "Chatting with Sonya and Friends" and founding operator of Mocha Media Management, LLC. "Chatting with Sonya and Friends" is a diverse group of professional women of various talents and backgrounds engaging in relevant and unscripted conversations in the city of Erie on WICU-12. Sonya is an Erie native and proud mother of Johnathan Byes-Hopkins.

Yvonne Caputo, M.S., was a teacher in the Erie City School District for 18 years. She went on to be a therapist and a trainer for the Penn Foundation Employee Assistance Program, and as vice president of Human Resources for Frederick Living, a retirement community. While she has retired from her full-time position, she continues to offer management training for St. Luke's Penn Foundation and private counseling on a part-time basis. She holds bachelor's and master's degrees in elementary education, and a master's degree in clinical psychology from Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. Her first book, "Flying with Dad," was a finalist in the 2020 Best Book Awards American Book Fest competition.

Raven Clark, B.A., is an Erie native and current Satellite Program Coordinator at the JES. In 2019, she graduated with her Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Allegheny College and is currently working on her Master of Science in Communications at Syracuse University. Raven has a background in research and writing in the social sciences and is a lifelong artist (violin) and patron of the arts. She is interested in the intersections of business, politics, public policy, ethics, sustainability, economics, agriculture, art, culture, and fashion, and aspires to become a journalist.

Michael E. DeSanctis, Ph.D., is professor emeritus of Fine Arts and Theology at Gannon University. He is a four-time recipient of the Student Government Association "Excellence in Teaching" award and has been honored with the Bishop Donald W. Trautman "Feed My Sheep" award for his commitment to the University's Catholic mission. Dr. DeSanctis is an active supporter of ecumenical dialogue and serves on the board of Inter-Church Ministries of Erie County. He and his physician-wife, Kelli, are members of St. Jude the Apostle Church, where they head up the OCIA/Adult Education initiative. Adrienne Dixon, Ph.D., is president and CEO of Sarah A. Reed Children's Center and teaches in the Counseling Program at PennWest Edinboro University. Adrienne holds a master's degree in Counseling, a post-master's Certificate in Marital and Family Therapy, and a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology. Adrienne has more than 35 years of clinical experience as a professional counselor, educator, and administrator. Her area of focus has been on Serious Mental Illness (children, families, and adults) and includes settings such as inpatient, residential treatment, drug and alcohol, and outpatient services. Additionally, she conducts professional training and workshops for organizations in the areas of Diversity, Organizational Competence, Clinical Interventions, Strengths Based Assessment, Supervision, and Enhanced Mental Health Services.

Emily Fetcko, B.S., is the CEO of Erie Downtown Partnership. She has 20 years of community and economic development experience and works across the community to marry opportunity with resources writing grants that have contributed \$1.6 million toward downtown revitalization in Erie. She has led downtown public art projects that included collaborations with refugees, English as a Second Language students, minority artists, and educators. Emily has a Bachelor of Science degree in Communications and Public Relations. She represents the region as a board member of the Pennsylvania Downtown Center.

James Fisher, Ph.D., is a professor of Politics and Legal Studies at Penn West Edinboro University. He has taught at the Edinboro campus since 2000 and is an alumnus of the school (with bachelor's degrees in political science and English). He holds a law degree from the College of William and Mary and a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He teaches courses in law and politics, political theory, and American politics. He is particularly interested in reproductive politics, civil liberties, and the United States Supreme Court. He regularly gives public lectures and participates in public forums discussing constitutional and legal issues. Professor Fisher trained as a community organizer with the Gamaliel Foundation and has served in leadership positions on the boards of several nonprofit organizations. At Edinboro, he has served as interim provost and associate provost and is currently the PennWest interim dean of the College of Social Sciences & Human Services. He has been nominated twice for Edinboro's Educator of the Year award.

Sabina Freeman, B.A., holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism from Ohio State University. Freeman currently has several books in print about people and places in the Erie area. Her first book was about Erie city and county women, "Erie History the Women's Story," which she co-authored with Margaret Tenpas in 1982 for the American Association of University Women (AAUW). Freeman's books are available through the Fairview Area Historical Society, the Hagen History Center (Erie County Historical Society), two local bookstores and her website, hiftightpress.com. Freeman has contributed articles to several historical magazines and is currently working on a comprehensive biography of Girard's circus showman Dan Rice.

David Frew, Ph.D., a prolific author and historian, is an emeritus professor at Gannon University, where he held a variety of administrative positions during a 33-year career. He is also emeritus director of the Erie County Historical Society and is president of his own management consulting business. Dr. Frew has written or co-written 40 books, most recently "Accidental Paradise: A 13,000-Year History of Presque Isle," and more than 100 articles, cases, and papers. His work has appeared in publications ranging from refereed journals such as the Journal of Applied Psychology to popular magazines such as Sail Magazine and Cruising World. Growing up on Erie's lower west side as a proud Bay Rat, Dr. Frew was known to join neighborhood kids playing and marauding along the west bayfront. He has written for years about his beloved Presque Isle and his adventures on the Great Lakes. In the "On the Waterfront Series" for the JES, the scholar-in-residence takes note of life in and around the water.

Regina Gaston, P.M.P., is a native of Chicago, Illinois. She has 18 years of IT and business experience. As an employee of Erie Insurance, she is a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion leader, as she is involved in the nine Affinity Networks, particularly the African American Affinity Network. She enjoys teaching problem skills to inner city youth, bridging the technology gap for senior citizens, and teaching choir. She is a proud resident of Erie, where she lives with her family.

Dr. Baher Ghosheh, Ph.D., is a scholar-in-residence at the Jefferson Educational Society in Erie, Pennsylvania. An expert in Middle Eastern Studies, he holds a Ph.D. in Economic Development from SUNY-Buffalo and was a Professor of Middle Eastern Studies, cultural and economic Geography at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania until retiring in 2022. He has graduate degrees in International Relations/Middle Eastern Studies, International Trade, and Comparative Economic Development. A native of Jerusalem, Dr. Ghosheh has lived in eight countries, traveled to 59 countries, and has taught in Japan, China, Russia, Italy, and Morocco. He was awarded a Fulbright to conduct research in Malaysia and Singapore and was selected as the Pennsylvania Geographer of the Year and Edinboro University's Educator of the Year.

Ken Gormley, J.D., was the 11th dean of the Thomas R. Kline School of Law of Duquesne University and became Duquesne University's 13th president in July 2016. Gormley joined Duquesne's law faculty in 1994, after teaching at the University of Pittsburgh School of Law and engaging in private practice. Gormley earned his B.A. from the University of Pittsburgh in 1977 and his J.D. from Harvard Law School in 1980. Gormley's work on myriad legal/historical topics has earned him a national reputation as a leading constitutional scholar. In 1997, he published *Archibald Cox: Conscience of a Nation* (Perseus Books 1997), the authorized biography of one of the leading lawyers and public servants of the 20th century. In 2010, Gormley published *"The Death of American Virtue: Clinton vs. Starr"* (Crown), a New York Times bestseller chronicling the scandals that plagued the Bill Clinton President of the Allegheny County Bar Association, the first academic to hold that position in the organization's 137-year history. From 1998 to 2001, he served as mayor of Forest Hills, Pennsylvania.

Jim Grazio, Ph.D., serves as the Great Lakes biologist for the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection based at the Tom Ridge Environmental Center. He provides scientific support to the agency on a wide variety of topics related to the environmental health of Presque Isle Bay and Lake Erie. Over the course of his career Dr. Grazio has developed a particular interest in Aquatic Invasive Species. He currently represents his agency on a number of state, regional, and binational management committees related to this topic and has served as the past chairman of the Great Lakes Panel on Aquatic Nuisance Species. Dr. Grazio is also an adjunct member of the School of Science at Penn State Behrend and currently co-teaches the capstone course in the Environmental Science major. His talk includes a history of biological invasions in the Great Lakes, as well as current hot topics related to AIS management.

Ed Grode, M.A., is a former Fulbright Scholar to the United Kingdom, received his master's degree in American History from the University of Notre Dame. He later went on to serve as principal at Perry, Strong Vincent, and Technical Memorial high schools in Erie, and as the Director of the Institute for Geography Education at Mercyhurst University until his retirement. For close to a decade, he was a board member of the United States Committee for Refugees and Immigrants, visiting refugee camps in Kenya, Rwanda, and Thailand. He has visited the Kakuma Refugee Camp 10 times and is currently working on a history of the camp with his colleague, Dr. Rahul Oka, of the Anthropology Department at the University of Notre Dame.

Robert Kibler, Ph.D., is chairman of the Division of World Languages and Cultural Studies, and a professor of English and Humanities at Minot State University in North Dakota. His research focuses on the intersections of Latin, Chinese, and Modernist literatures, especially in respect to internationalism, travel, adventure, and ancient rituals and ceremonies. He has written and presented on ancient Chinese philosophy, African tribal life, British Imperial ventures in Africa and Asia, internecine war and violence in the Balkans, and on nationalism in all of its forms. Dr. Kibler's primary scholarly interest, however, follows the trajectory of his dissertation, which explores the debt owed by Ezra Pound's The Cantos poems to Naxi culture, a secluded tribe near the Chinese Tibetan border.

Gary N. Lee, M.B.A., is the chief administrative officer for the Erie County Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Commission, also known as Diverse Erie. He leads a team on the design, facilitation, and execution of the commission's vision, mission, and goals. In working closely with the Board of Commissioners, Mr. Lee promotes and advances the commission's mission by leading the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion actions and initiatives throughout the region. Mr. Lee was born and raised in Erie. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in graphics communications technology from California University of Pennsylvania, and a Master of Business Administration degree from Gannon University. Mr. Lee has been recognized as one of America's Most Outstanding Men for outstanding, superior leadership ability and exceptional service to the community.

Judith Lynch, Ph.D., has been a board member of the Jefferson Educational Society since its inception and served as its first chairwoman. She is the Jefferson's first and only Decadean Scholar and continues to serve as a scholar-in-residence. From 2004 to 2017, Dr. Lynch served as Associate Professor of Political Science and History at Mercyhurst University, and from 2002 to 2004, she taught at Allegheny College and was part of the Civic Engagement Institute. Prior, she worked as an analyst for the CIA and served for 20 years as Erie County executive, the county's top elected official. She received her Doctorate with Distinction in Political Science in 2001 from the University of Pittsburgh and her M.A. in Social Studies from Gannon University. Her undergraduate degree, a B.A. in History and Political Science, is from George Washington University.

Christopher Magno, Ph.D., has been teaching criminal justice at Gannon University since 2013. He holds a Ph.D. in Criminal Justice, Department of Criminal Justice, Indiana University

in Bloomington. His research focuses on urban crime, urban issues and Geographic Information System. For his innovative teaching and engagement in the Globalization Speaker Series and Community-based Mapping Exhibit he received Gannon's Faculty Award for Excellence in Service-Learning and the Cooney-Jackman Endowed Professorship (2013-2016). Students in his class explore theories and realities of crime and justice. Magno developed crime web exercises over several years of teaching criminal justice and he orchestrates senior student projects for the community-based Mapping Exhibit.

Michael Kenton Mahler, B.S., has been the co-editor of Erie Gay News since it was founded in December 1992. He is also a founding member of NWPA Pride Alliance. He serves on the Erie Mayor's LGBTQ Advisory Council, the Pennsylvania Commission for LGBTQ Affairs, as well as on the boards for Community Health Net and Drenched Fur. He became the first LGBTQ person to be fully out in May 1992 when appearing on local television coverage. Michael currently works as a programmer and analyst for Erie Custom Computer Applications.

Rhonda Matthews, Ph.D., is an associate professor of political science and women's studies in the Department of Political Science and Criminal Justice at PennWest Edinboro University. Rhonda has been with the university since 2002 and served as the director of the Dr. Robert C. Weber Honors Program for three years. Prior to her work at Edinboro, she taught at other institutions and worked in the fields of diversity affairs and residence life. Rhonda is dedicated to the advocacy and empowerment of women and children as a result of her previous work as a sexual assault survivor counselor. Using tenets of intersectional analysis, her primary areas of academic interest include gender and women's studies, sociological theory, popular culture, and stratification.

Precious McKesson was the first African American woman in Nebraska to cast an electoral vote in December 2020 for president since the passing of the electoral college act in 1992.
